

YOUR INVITATION FOR A LIFETIME OPPORTUNITY.

The Supreme Court of Texas is accepting applications for 2014-2015 law clerk positions. Each justice hires two law clerks for a one-year term that begins in mid-August. Applications are open to all students who will have graduated by the beginning of the law clerkship as well as to licensed attorneys. Strong preference is given to candidates with outstanding academic records and demonstrated writing ability.

Each law clerk assists his or her judge with legal research, studying petitions for review, preparation for oral argument, and researching and drafting opinions. The Supreme Court of Texas has discretionary review and hears civil cases only. Almost exclusively among appellate courts, the Court permits law clerks to sit in conference during its deliberations. Law clerks may be asked to make oral presentations or answer questions about the law or the facts during conference.

Applicants must submit a separate application (cover letter, résumé, unofficial law-school transcript, writing sample, and two letters of recommendation) to each justice to whom he or she wishes to apply. Letters of recommendation may be sent separately.

Chief Justice Jefferson and Justices Willett, Guzman, Lehrmann and Devine prefer paper applications. To apply to those justices, please mail a separate application to each justice at Supreme Court of Texas, P.O. Box 12248, Austin, Texas 78711. Justices Hecht, Green, Johnson, and Boyd prefer electronic applications. The Court does not follow the Federal Law Clerk Hiring Plan. No application deadline exists and applications will be reviewed on a rolling basis. Law clerks have been hired from leading schools throughout the United States.

The Supreme Court of Texas is an equal opportunity employer. No applicant will be refused employment because of race, color, ethnic background, religion, creed, sex, sexual orientation, marital status, age, or any similar consideration. The annual salary for a law clerk is approximately \$50,000.
